Participants are divided into groups of 6 and each group is assigned a complex clinical case with 6 questions and a tutor. Participants must address the 6 questions (one per student) using PowerPoint slides, according to a strict format. Each will present as a teacher to the other groups.

Clinical cases:

Case I: Patient with splenomegaly and low platelet count.

Differential diagnosis and follow up.

Case II: Patient with acute variceal bleeding.

Management according to individual risk.

Case III: Patient with HCV cirrhosis and previous variceal bleeding achieving SVR after antiviral treatment.

Case IV: Patient with decompensated liver disease and splanchnic vein thrombosis requiring liver transplantation.

Case V: A 30-year-old patient with grey hair preserved liver function and large esophageal varices.

Case VI: A coinfected HCV + HIV patient with portal Hypertension
